Do you see us as a small country library? Actually, that's not who we are at all. We're not really "small." As a member of the Clinton-Essex-Franklin Library System (CEFLS), we are one of 33 libraries and we are able to draw on the resources of all the members of the system. If you want a particular book, DVD, reference, or audio book, if it exists in the system, we will help you find it. A CEFLS van makes weekly deliveries so typically you don't have to wait long.

We're not really a "country" library either. We have computers, WiFi and high-speed internet available to the public. We have the ability to print, copy, scan and fax your documents. Upstairs we have the beautiful Steven Kellogg Children's Reading Room and an expanding book collection for children. And we offer interesting programs for all ages, from Miss Sally's offerings for young children, to the MacMan's computer workshops.

Sharing ideas and knowledge

We strive to be a place where ideas and knowledge are shared. Often knowledge is hiding in plain sight. Our **Getting to Know Your Neighbors** series is based on the recognition that there's much value in the stories of people who make Essex a great place.

We also use your ideas to enhance what we do day-to-day. When a young mother recently inquired about opening the library earlier one day a week because toddlers nap after lunch, we switched our Wednesday hours to the morning and added a storytime. When patrons suggest books to be added to our collection, we give these suggestions high priority. The same is true for programs. Patron suggestions and connections brought us author Liam Callanan in May and will bring us poet/author Baron Wormser on August 30.

It's a two-way process. The library provides you with many sources of knowledge -- and listening to you, our patrons, enhances the library in its mission.

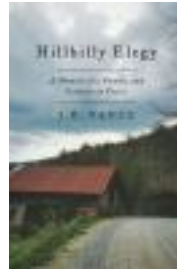
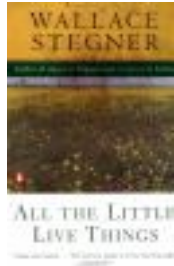
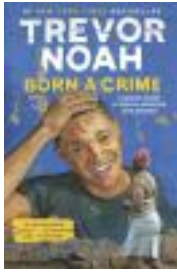

What we are reading



Colleen: *Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood* by Trevor Noah. If you have ever been to South Africa, read about apartheid, or watched Trevor Noah on late night TV, this is a great read. The child of a biracial couple at a time when such a union was illegal, Trevor recounts his upbringing with honesty, openness and humor. His stories are compelling and inspiring – and often both tragic and comic at the same time. His path from Soweto to late-night TV is amazing. Occasionally I did have to remind myself not to judge life in Soweto by my cultural standards. Enjoy!

Maureen: *All the Little Live Things*, by Wallace Stegner, a favorite author of mine – his writing can make your jaw drop. The book's main character is Joe Allston, an aging and cranky literary agent who has retired with his wife to what should be a paradise. But a neighbor – sweet, forgiving, gentle young Marian - and an odd, entitled interloper named Peck cause Allston (and the reader) to ponder youth, age, life, death, and human relations in general. This would be a great book discussion selection.

Monica: *Hillbilly Elegy* by J.D. Vance, which relates the harsh realities and unexpected successes that people experience in poverty-stricken Appalachia. It's a tale that translates just as readily to life among those less fortunate in the Adirondacks, shedding light on the human condition wherever it may be.

Tom: *Personal History* by Katharine Graham. I was tremendously impressed by the portrayal of Katharine Graham's courage and strength in Steven Spielberg's film in *The Post*, which focused on her decision to publish the Pentagon Papers in 1971. I followed up by reading her autobiography, written in the late 1990s. I learned that this episode was only one of many crises she managed with grace and skill in the course of her lifetime!
