## Storytime Kits—Grant Funded

To Our Summer Residents: You may get a library card to use during your time in Essex. Stop in to speak with Julie about how to get your card and begin borrowing materials.



We applied for, and received, a grant from the **Adirondack** 

Foundation's Generous Acts program which allowed us to create 11 Grab and Go Story Time kits. Each kit is based on a theme including ABCs, Bears, Bedtime, Colors, Counting, Clothing, Dinosaurs, Farms, Food, Going To School, and Vehicles.

Each kit contains 5 books, a sheet of fingerplay activities, a flannel board or magnetic board story, an educational toy and a craft activity. The kits may be checked out for two weeks with a valid library card.

We have Museum passes to loan!

The Fort Ticonderoga Discount Pass provides a 10% discount off the admission price.

The Wild Center Discover Pass admits 2 adults for \$10 and 4 children (through age 17) for free. The passes are loaned for three days beginning on the date of check out. Passes may be reserved for specific dates in person or via telephone, and are also loaned on a walk-in basis.

Borrowers must hold a Belden Noble Memorial Library card to check out a museum pass.

## What We're Reading

Rinda Foster: Dance, Dance, Dance by Haruki Murakami

This novel by Haruki Murakami follows his Rat Trilogy. Murakami's writing is sometimes called magical realism. It is pleasant and comforting to be in his strange world.

Joyce Sukel: The Paris Secret by Natasha Lester. This is a stirring portrait of a daring group of women willing to risk it all in time of war.

Maureen Ecclesine: The Stranger In the Lifeboat by Mitch Albom. Albom keeps us guessing until the end: Is this strange man really who he claims to be?

Kathy Nadire: Valcour: The 1776 Campaign That Saved the Cause of Liberty by Jack Kelly. The book gives details about the conflicts of the Revolutionary War that took place on Lake Champlain. Many local areas are mentioned. Monica Rumsey: Orphan Train by Christina Baker Kline. This novel is based on a true story that, between 1854 and 1929, more than 200,000 orphaned children were sent from cities in the East to be adopted by farming families in the Midwest and West.

## **Essex Wall of Literary Fame Continues to Grow**



When the wall was dedicated last summer it honored 25 full or part-time Essex residents who had published a print book of prose or poetry. Not bad for a town of 621 people! Since then four more individuals have been identified who qualify for this honor, and more may emerge. Here's a brief sketch of each of the four; more detail is available at the library or on its web site at essexlibrary.org.

Peter Gow is an independent school teacher and administrator who has written several books on such educational topics as leadership and teacher training. He is also an editor and writer of local history. He spends his summers at the Crater Club.

Christopher Locke is a poet who moved to the Adirondacks ten years ago and to Essex hamlet in 2021. He teaches at North Country Community College and Plattsburgh State. He recently read from his latest collection of poems, Music for Ghosts, at the Whallonsburgh Grange.

John H. Noble III is descended from one of Essex's oldest families (the library is named for his great, great uncle.) John worked in higher education as a career center director and has written or edited many books on career topics. He summers at the Crater Club and winters in Plymouth, MA.

**Betsy Tisdale** is a writer, photographer and lecturer. She authored the first edition of the Guide to Adirondack Trails: Eastern Edition, which required her to cover more than 200 miles of trails. Betsy has deep roots in Essex. When she is not in residence on Couchey Hill, she lives in Potsdam, NY.
