It would be remiss of me to start our Summer 2023 newsletter with anything other than appreciation. Residents of all ages visit the library during the busiest and slower times of year. It has been amazing to see dedicated "regular" and new patrons use their library year-round, sometimes while using personal fans and wading through snow banks. Board members and I have enjoyed watching children walk out with piles of books almost as big as they are.

Attendance at in-person programs, and participation in "take away" activities fill us with gratitude that you, and the Town of Essex, continue to support us. It is rewarding to see that many non-profit organizations throughout the county regard our little library as worthy partners in their various projects. We've been working hard to maintain and even increase library use after a global pandemic, and you are still here with us. A growing list of our generous contributors during 2022, and information about how you can support your library, are included in this issue.

We are pleased to offer the community a free family concert this July, thanks to funding from the Essex County Arts Council. We've worked hard throughout the year to obtain state and federal grant funds, as well as support from local private organizations such as the Essex Community Fund. This summer we are pleased to have the opportunity to paint sunflowers in the style of Georgia O'Keeffe, discuss The Air We Breathe by Andrea Barrett, learn to write memoirs with the help of a published author, initiate the "Sunburst Film Festival", and create film "binge boxes" for all ages. Grant funding and community support will help increase access to our services for all users, and will allow us to expand the focus of the children's room to include a dedicated space for older children.

Members of the library board and I hope you enjoy the busy summer season. Thank you for continuing to make your library an important part of your schedule. **Julie Wever, Director** 

### **Grant Helps Our "Growing" Population**

The Essex Community Fund of the Adirondack Foundation awarded the library a grant to help our "growing" population. The grant comes from the endowment funds raised in memory of Baird and Doffie Voorhis.

Our youngest patrons are "growing" up and the grant will help us to adapt to their needs. The Children's Room will be reconfigured to encourage and support the use of digital and print resources by elementary age children and their families. An inviting space will be created and equipped to encourage children to read, collaborate, create and study.

This same population will also be "growing" pollinators in two non-permanent raised bed boxes to be placed on the gravel areas in front of the library. The grant funds will support the library's new partnership with Adirondack Action's "Library Buzz" program and the Town's green initiatives. In addition, the boxes will beautify the area in front of the library.



## What We're Reading

Colleen Van Hoven: Solito by Javier Zamora

American Dirt fictionalizes the struggles of illegal immigrants trying to reach the United States. Solito is the real thing. This book is Zamora's detailed memoir of his perilous 3000-mile trek from El Salvador to "The U.S.A." when he was just nine years old. He traveled alone, relying on a small group of strangers and the "coyote", the paid leader, to help him. Zamora could easily have focused on the pains and dangers of illegal immigration but instead his emphasis is on the humanity of the people he encountered. Fortunately, there is a happy ending to Zamora's story but it takes him a long time to reach it.

**Kathy Nadire: : Mrs. Jack: A Biography of Isabella Stewart Gardner** by Louise Hall Tharp My sister sent this book to me, knowing of my interest in the Gardner Museum and also the art theft that took place there in 1990. This is a wonderful and very readable biography of a fascinating woman, who in her time was called "one of the seven wonders of Boston".



**Kathie Manthorne**: I recently read **The Daughter of Time** (1951), the fourth of Josephine Tey's mysteries featuring Scotland Yard detective Alan Grant, who applies his ability to interpret faces to a portrait of Richard III, King of England 1483-1485. Questioning the king's reputation as a deformed nephew killer – partly perpetuated by Shakespeare's play – Grant conducts research from his hospital bed to "prove" Richard's innocence. With its many exciting twists and turns, this wildly popular crime novel led to many sympathetic biographies of Richard that in turn inspired Philippa Langley's discovery of the long-lost royal skeleton under a parking lot in Leicester. **Meredith Hanna: Trust** by Herman Diaz The book has several stories within a story but revolves around a secretive wealthy couple, the Rasks. Benjamin has new money and his wife, Helen, is from a family of long standing wealth and philanthropy Benjamin's life revolves around the stock market ticker tape in a small closet off his large office with walls lined with leather bound books. Their fortune grows in spite of or perhaps because of the stock market crash in 1929. The book has many similarities to what's going on today in the financial markets and like any mystery we try to figure out the well hidden secrets of elite society.

Joyce Sukel: The Lost Girls of Paris by Pam Jenoff A remarkable story of friendship and courage centered on three women and a ring of female secret agents during World War II.
